# JAPAN'S VICTORY.

## It is Alleged Chinese Acted Like Cowards.

But this is Emphatically Denied in a Shanghai Despatch.

The Japanese government has issued the following official statement of the recent un gagement between warships of Japan and

"In consequence of severe provocation three ships of the Japanese musilron were compelled to engage the Chinese freet of Fantae or Round Island. They captured the Chlures warship Tree Kian and sank a Chinese transport with soldiers on board. Unfortunately one of the largest Chinese frontials of the northern fleet, the Chen-Yuen, escaped to China and the Chinese terresto cruker es-caped to Fusan, Japan. The three Japanese warships engaged were the Alikushima, the Takachibo and the Hi-Yei. They escaped

without injury."

Naval officers in Washington were much in-Naval officers in Washington were much as terested in the official report from Yokohama of the engagements between Chinese and Japanese squadrons. The result confirmed their estimate of the superiority of the Japanese hary. 
