Perhaps the learned judge in imposing the latter sentence may have taken into consideration the age of the respondent, or the admission of the fair plaintiff herself at the hearing of the case. But be that as it may, without any mitigating circumstances, how is the above for justice?

THE THREE LINKS.
Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., at Montpelier.

The 44th annual session of the Grand Lodge of Vermont, I. O. O. F., was held in Odd Fellows Hall at Montpelier last week Wednesday, with Grand Master M. J. Horton in the chair, and the other officers at their respective stations.

The Grand Lodge degree was conferred on 33 candidates, making about 200 members in attendance.

The grand master gave a plain and practical presentation of his official labors during the past year, showing good results and a healthful condition of the order in this jurisdiction. Grand Secretary Harry E. Parker presented an interesting and voluminous report, showing that five new lodges have been instituted; gain in membership, 370. Three lodges have over 200 members each and five over 100 each. The largest lodge numbers 331, the smallest 13. Thirty-one lodges make a gain in membership while thirty show a loss. The greatest gain in any one lodge 57. Gain in receipts is \$4,743.52 and in regalia \$5,549.77. The number of lodges is 44; membership 3170. Rebekah membership, 1087. Receipts of subordinate lodges \$21,175.25; financial value

\$32,723.01, amount paid for the relief of Old Fellows and their families, \$5,629.51.

After routine work and legislation these officers were elected:—J. W. Goodell of Burlington was unanimously elected grand master; L. T. Retting of Brattleboro, unanimously elected deputy grand master; H. C. Farrar, Rutland, grand warden; Harry E. Parker, Bradford, grand secretary, and this is the fifth successive time he has been elected; L. R. Robinson, Derby Line, grand treasurer; Frank A. Sherburne, Montpelier, grand chaplain; M. J. Horton, Poultney, grand representative to S. G. L. The appointed officers are W. D. Chandler, St. Albans, grand marshal; F. H. Hyde, Poultney, grand conductor; G. W. Beck, St. Johnsbury, grand guardian; F. D. Forsaith, Concord, grand herald. The district deputy grand master for district No. 5, which includes Essex Lodge of Island Pond, is L. A. Spaulding of Newport.

A committee was appointed comprising D. G. Farman of Swanton, N. P. Bowman of St. Johnsbury, H. W. Hall of Burlington, H. L. Stillson of Bennington, and L. V. Greene of Rutland, to consider the advisability of establishing a home for aged and indigent Odd Fellows, and to perfect plans and report at the next session of this body.

The time of the annual session was changed from the first Wednesday in June to the third Wednesday in May.

Reports showed a larger per centage of gain in membership in Vermont during the past year, than in any other State in the union.

Henry Clark, from the committee on resolutions, reported a testimonial to the grand master for his efficient and conservative administration of the affairs of the jurisdiction during his term of office, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

At the closing session, held at 7 p. m., the officers were installed and the remaining business matters transacted. The session throughout was harmonious and enjoyable.
