Republican State Convention.
The Republican State Committee have issued the formal call for the State convention, as follows:
The Republicans of Vermont are hereby requested to meet in Convention at Burlington, on Wednesday, June 22, 1922, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the office of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, Secretary of State, Auditor of Accounts, and two Presidential Electors at large, to be supported by the Freeholders of the State at the next September election.
To be represented in said Convention by their delegates, on the basis of one delegate from each town, one for every one hundred votes, and one for every fraction of one hundred votes exceeding fifty cast for the Republican candidates for Governor in 1918.
Delegates will be chosen at primary meetings called by the Freeholders of each town and city, and will provide themselves with proper credentials signed by the Secretary of said primary meeting, at which they are elected, and present the same to the State Committee at their headquarters at the Van Ness House, immediately upon their arrival.
The usual courtesy of fare one-way will be extended by the several railroads to the State Convention, and return tickets will be given upon the black credentials sent each town committee.
On the above basis Essex County will be entitled to represent as follows:

Bridport 3 East Haven 1
Burlington 3 Middlebury 1
Canaan 3 Guildhall 2
Canaan 3 Victory 1

MEMORIAL DAY.

Next Monday the graves of the soldiers who died during and since the late war will be decorated with flowers, and the whole nation will testify to its appreciation of the services rendered by the defenders of the Union. The yearly observance of Memorial Day is not only an honor to the memory of the dead soldiers, but it is also an appeal to the spirit of patriotism in the people, young and old. It recalls the service of the men who fought for the Union, and awakens in the young an appreciation of that for which so many men laid down their lives. Only one day of the year is devoted to reviving in the memories of the living the glorious achievements of the noble dead who perished that our country might live. We may not give our country the same proofs of our unselfish devotion that these heroes have done. Happily the storms of war have passed, we hope forever. But the duty of preserving that country glorious and free devolves upon the generation now on the scene, and the memory of the dead should inspire us to an unselfish performance of duties that are required of patriots even in time of peace.

We hope and believe that the convention will be as favorably impressed with the merits of the man, as his friends who know him best are.

The Herald favors the nomination of Col. F. Stewart Stranahan, of St. Albans, for Lieutenant Governor.
